FYE Seminar

Media Mirror explores creative ways to use entertainment and information media to learn more about ourselves and others and to enrich our everyday lives. We will study how images reflect, inform and influence the ways we think and live. We will explore how you create, use and interpret external media – which include art, television, print publications and the Internet – and how those media both mirror and shape everything you think, feel and do.

Media and Society


What is the relationship between media industry and media content? How does popular culture articulate cultural beliefs and practices? How do we analyze and interpret the media industries? This course is designed to equip students with the key concepts, theories, and methods to undertake their own critical analyses of media and the industries that make them. It will examine how media emerge within specific social and historical contexts and how they participate in ideological practices with wide-reaching cultural consequences.

Mind and Society

This course is an introduction to psychological research methods, child and adult development, personality structure and functioning, social processes in every day life, cultural and cross-cultural models of human adaptation, and abnormal clinical psychology. This course is part of a two-term sequence in introductory psychology. The other course in this sequence (PSY 201) emphasizes learning, perception, memory, and the role of neural structures in psychological processes.
