ABOUT THIS FIG

College Connections

This FIG will use Eugene as a laboratory to examine the politics of transportation around decisions about bus rapid transit, bicycle lanes, and highway extensions. Students will explore power in transportation decision-making and the language used in the media to discuss transit and bicycle riders.

Introduction to Environmental Studies: Humanities

In this course we will learn about what the Humanities are, as an interdisciplinary field, and how Humanities methods and research contribute to environmental thought and action. The class involves reading and research but also creativity and innovation. It is a lab in which we will think together about the possible futures of our stressed planet and how to harness imagination in the service of sustainability.

Introduction to City Planning

This course introduces students to the field of city planning – an academic discipline that synthesizes a diverse set of fields, thinks about how the world should ideally be, then figures out how to move in that direction. The course will cover a range of focal areas in the field of planning including: physical and land use planning, public health, housing, community development, social equity, environmental planning and transportation planning. The purpose of the course is to give students a general context of what planning is, the topics it deals with, and to convey that the way cities are designed and function is lively and ever changing. Ultimately, the purpose of this course is to inspire students to see that the field of city planning is a mechanism to make the world a better place.
