Start building your front-end web coding skills (HTML/CSS in CIS 110) and your business skills (in BA 101) by joining this FIG.

Fluency with Information Technology

The goal of CIS 110 is for you to understand enough about computational thinking that you could come up with a new idea of how to use computation to solve your own problem, or understand someone else's new idea on how to use computation, and see its value. From logical thought to programming, database concepts to website architecture, information privacy and security to networking and multimedia, CIS 110 is designed to help you understand how computational thinking can be used to transform information into knowledge in your field of study.

Introduction to Business

This course is designed to challenge you to learn about private enterprise and to better understand how organizations operate within that environment. The course will help you understand the economic dimensions of your life and your four roles in the private enterprise system: consumer, employee, owner and citizen. To make informed decisions in each of these roles, you need to understand both the basic principles of the system and its complexity. You will begin building your understanding by studying the kinds of decisions that are made in organizations, the models managers use to help them make the decisions and how those decisions are shaped by the competitive environment.
