ABOUT THIS FIG

FYE Seminar

This FIG explores anti-racist, feminist approaches to developing ethical ambition, achieving success, and pursuing happiness. This course will also help introduce students to the academic and social aspects of university life. This course will facilitate opportunities to discuss relationships between the other courses in the FIG, helping to break down some of the barriers that typically exist between academic disciplines.

Introduction to Ethnic Studies

This course will introduce you to the academic field of Ethnic Studies, the interdisciplinary and comparative study of race, ethnicity and indigeneity in the United States. It will present how race and racism shape the world, both in the past and in the present. Multidisciplinary study focusing on Americans of African, Asian, Latino, and Native American descent. Topics include group identity, language in society and culture, forms of resistance, migration, and social oppression. ES 101 ill provide students with the ability to critically analyze today's racial climate.

Introduction to Women's and Gender Studies

Placing women's experiences at the center of interpretation, Introduction to Women's and Gender Studies (WGS 101) introduces basic concepts and perspectives in Women's and Gender Studies. Focusing on contemporary issues (with some reference to historical trends), we will examine lived experience with a particular emphasis on how gender interacts with other social constructs such as race, class, sexuality, and ability.
